Thank you everyone for your donations and prayers for the Southeastern Walk For Life! On September 14, the Pentecost Lutheran team participated in the Walk, raising \$800. The Walk supports Alliance Family Services, a Christian nonprofit committed to serving the women and families in our communities, championing the sanctity of human life. Alliance shares the gospel and trusts God to transform lives. They are located in Racine, Kenosha, and La Crosse. They also have a maternity home in Kenosha, and a mobile clinic that is set up near Planned Parenthood in Milwaukee where they can pray with and for mothers considering abortion and show them that they can choose life for their babies. Alliance provides medical, practical, and spiritual support as these women and families walk through pregnancy and through parenthood. Alliance also shares God's grace and mercy with those seeking healing from abortions.

Each week, I have the joy of teaching childbirth classes to the moms and dads receiving support through Alliance. What an honor to see the blessing of new life and growing families, to watch parents gain confidence, and to hear their precious birth stories. There is nothing quite like a growing baby in their mama's belly, God's design for pregnancy and birth, a father caring for his wife and child, and parents taking on the best job with all its twists and turns.

As the Church, we are called by God to speak and act on behalf of those who are vulnerable and defenseless. We are called to share the wonderful message that every human life was created and redeemed by God. Every life, no matter what stage of development is known and loved by God. Since abortion has become legalized in America around 1.3 million children are killed each year, and that's just in our country. In many ways it is a repeat of the eugenics movement that took place in Germany during the 1920's and 1930's. The physically and mentally disabled were killed in the name of "compassion". The Church did little to speak out against that. And today, right now, children are being killed because of their location, status, ability, or convenience. May the Gospel motivate us to fight for the legal protection of all life. May we, the Church, stand up with our voices, our actions, our compassion and never stop sharing the good news of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with our neighbors.

Operation Christmas Child and Samaritan's Purse collection is underway. OCC collects shoeboxes filled with gifts and delivers them to children in need around the world. Every one of these shoebox gifts is an opportunity for the Gospel. This year there are two options to help. You can fill a shoebox online and they will do all the packing and shipping for you. There will also be shoeboxes available in the narthex, you can purchase one at Hobby Lobby or you can pack using a regular shoebox from home. Pack it for a boy or a girl. Start with a "wow" toy such as a doll, soccer ball with pump, or stuffed animal. Then fill it with other fun toys, hygiene items, and school supplies. Things not to include: candy, toothpaste, used or damaged items, war-related items such as toy guns, knives, or military figures, seeds, chocolate, food, liquids, lotions, vitamins, medications, or breakable items. Most importantly, pray for the child who will receive your gift. If you look closely, you can see the small trees that were planted in front of the church. Those trees grew and grew and GREW until we finally had to cut them down.




This fall Glen, Casey, and Gordie worked on beautifying the front of the church with some new landscaping. Thanks, guys, for all your hard work.
